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# Friedman Visits Council

Assemblymember Laura Friedman attended the Glendale City Council meeting on Tuesday night, Nov. 29, to give a wrap up of some legislation that occurred on the state level.

"We had a good year in Sacramento in terms of the budget and I was able to secure nearly \$15 million for the City of Glendale," Friedman said.

The funding was in response to requests made by the Council. Friedman said she was able to get funding for all of the requests but added this was typical.

Friedman was able to secure more than \$6 million for the Glendale Central Library, which would be used to complete the Children's Room and new teen center.

"With this money the Children's Room is fully financed," she said.

She also mentioned the \$6 million in funding she secured for the Verdugo Wash Vision; in addition she secured \$2.5 million to acquire open space in the north end of Glendale and \$100,000 for the Glendale Fire Dept. for fuel reduction work.

She also secured funds dedicated for the bridge that is to connect Glendale to Griffith Park.

As to legislation, she highlighted some bills that had been signed into law including AB 1933, which is a bill involving Heritage Housing Partners and Habitat for Humanity, two nonprofits that build housing for low income residents.

"What this will do is allow for non-profit developers who are building 100% low income projects to be able to use the same tax incentives that they right now can use for rental properties [so they can build] home ownership properties," she said.

AB 452 is a bill Friedman said she worked on for three years that will require all school

he Verdugo Wash Vision is a project proposed by the City L of Glendale to promote "an urban design experience that will create memorability and recognition as a 'must visit' urban experience," according to the definition of the project on the City's website.

The project would create a 9.4-mile long linear park and nature trail for walking/cycling with access to business and entertainment venues ... it interweaves several important city centers, services and a multitude of neighborhoods, according to the City.

It is that later definition that worries many of the residents in the neighborhoods that butt up against this new "Vision." Those residents have voiced their concerns at outreach meetings and at a recent Nov. 15 City Council meeting. The issue is not that

# Taking A Look Outside Our Window

its holiday celebration knows what happens of propylene monomers and microballoons at the end of the fireworks presentation ... it snows. SoCal snow can be experienced without wearing a heavy winter coat and you won't have to get out the snow shovels.

Coming from Iowa, the first time I was caught in a "fake snowstorm" was a little strange. It didn't exactly look like real snow but there was something about seeing the light fluffy bubbles float from the rooftops of Disney's Main Street that made it actually feel like a white Christmas. Then the bubbles would pop and the illusion was gone; however, for that brief moment it was magical.

Most know the mythical story of how the film industry came to Hollywood. The costs of production were growing in New York and working through the winter was difficult. In the early 1900s, director D.W. Griffith and his crew got on a train and traveled west. The story goes the director got off the train in Flagstaff, Arizona. It was cold and snowy so he got back on the train and continued to Los Angeles. The first movie studio was built in a real estate area called Hollywoodland, later shortened to Hollywood, and the rest is

Shooting in sunny LA was great but that didn't mean movies stopped filming snowy scenes. In those first films many different effects were used for snow including cotton and foamite (material used in fire extinguishers) mixed with soap flakes, sugar and water.

"For miniatures we've used baking soda," said Dennis Skotak, an Academy Awardwinning visual effects artist whose films include "The Abyss" and "Aliens," to mention

tiny glass bubbles. "Microballoons looks like snow," he said. He said the tiny glass bubbles create a

snowing effect as they float down.

Another item used for miniatures is polyester fiberfill, like in pillows, according to Pat McClung, visual effects artist best know for "Armageddon" and "True Lies."

And for many films snowflakes are digitally added so actors stay warm on set while "snow" falls around them.

At Disneyland and other venues that have "snow" shoot out from machines, that is mostly tiny bubbles made of water and surfactants, a compound that reduces the surface tension of a liquid. It's basically tiny bubbles that glitter and float.

Even though in movies and at events the temperatures don't match the snowy scene there is something about the visual of snow, whether real or fake, that makes one feel cozy and in need of a hot chocolate.

For us, this week "cold" is not something that is imagined. There are two storm systems heading our way. The first is predicted to arrive Thursday night into Friday morning.

"It [will be] a little weaker [than originally expected] and it's moving faster than we thought. We are trimming back the [expected] rainfall amounts from 1/2 inch to 1 inch," said David Sweet, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). "There is another system coming through Saturday night into Sunday morning, and that's quite a bit drier with [expected rainfall] of 1/4 inch to 1/2 inch."

# A First Place Summer Robot Win

lark Magnet High School Circuit Breakers robotics team 696 is getting ready, along with thousands of other high school robotics teams, for this year's FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) robot competition. The description of the type of game in the competition will be released on Jan. 7, 2023. From that point forward teams only have a few weeks to decide how they will play the game; for example, offensively or defensively, then design and build the robot.

But for Clark students this is just another day in the world of robots ... and Team 696 loves a challenge. The team is coming off a first place win at this summer's Gene Haas Foundation Beach Blitz held at

Capistrano Valley High School in Mission Viejo.

Dino Hunter, a senior at Clark, is the lead electrical person and programmer with 696. He said the team's winning robot was the fastest and more consistent.

"It was one of the fastest [robots in FIRST] in California," he said.

Each year the FIRST competition announces the type of game that robots are to play. In the past the games have been a type of basketball, soccer and even a form of robotic tictac-toe. In almost every game robots can gain points by being able to lift, or climb, themselves up off the field floor. The Clark robot was able to do this every time.

Alex Boghossian is a senior and part of the manufacture and construction sub-team of 696. He has found Team 696 has

taught him many skills including leadership and dealing with all types of personalities.

Team 696 has gone through some changes lately. In the past only juniors and seniors could join the team but now it is open to students in all grades. Both Boghossian and Hunter think this is a good move.

"It's a great opportunity for [upperclassmen] to train [underclassmen] students," Boghossian said.

Hunter said a lot of teams this year are "rookie" teams so the chance to mentor is something he is looking forward to.

"We want to always make robots fun," he said.

When the challenge is released most teams take time to run through a checklist of what will need to be done and then brainstorm on design.

"Everybody gets hyped up thinking what [the robot] might be like," Hunter said. "Usually we discuss the design and everyone shares their input."

Hunter and Boghossian are

excited about the next challenge while acknowledging their last year on Team 696. They are very proud of what they have accomplished while on the team and their latest first place win. Though they have had a few weeks to bask in that victory, almost immediately they began thinking of what needs to be done to make the next robot even better. They'll strategize what went right and what needed improvement as they prepare for the next game ... and the next competition.







# The Complexities of Family Caregiving

No matter what stage of life, we all need to be cared for or at least cared about. Caring for family members later in life can be challenging and complex. Family caregiving can take its toll physically, financially and emotionally. Sometimes our inability to serve as a caregiver due to distance, physical limitations or work obligations weighs heavily on our minds and hearts.

The complexities of family caregiving are also compounded by who is providing the care and who is receiving the care. A spouse caring for their partner must manage their spouse's care while keeping up with their own aging-related issues. An adult child who is caring for an elderly parent may require juggling their own family's needs along with caring for the parent. Another family caregiving relationship that can be challenging is an older adult caring for a disabled adult child. As the parent ages, the physical demands of caregiving can take its toll and the parent's own health is often ignored.

November was National Family Caregiver month and the theme this year is "Caregiving Happens" — a reminder that it is not always convenient or expected. Caring for the caregiver is just as important as the care that is being provided to the family member in need.

Acknowledging that caregiving is a major stressor for many families, resources and programs are available through different avenues to support the entire family system. The USC Family Caregiver Support Center (www.fcsc.usc.edu) at the Leonard Davis School of Gerontology through its programs and services supports the journeys of both the care recipient and the caregiver. Caring for persons with dementia or Alzheimer's disease poses unique challenges. Alzheimer's Los Angeles (www. AlzheimersLA.org) and the Southern California Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association (www.alz.org/socal/) provide an array of educational and supportive services to help families navigate the complexities of caring for people with memory loss and cognitive impairment associated



with these diseases

Locally, the Community Resource Center for Aging at USC Verdugo Hills Hospital, in partnership with Home Instead and the Cañada-Crescenta YMCA, offers a "Caregiver Night Off" program once a month to provide respite and support to local families dealing with the daily challenges of caregiving. 





Mayor Ardy Kassakhian asked City

There was a presentation on the creative crosswalk projects. The streets that will be affected by the new crosswalks are Adams Street and Palmer Avenue, Broadway and Columbus avenues and Broadway Avenue and Galleria Way. The choices that were made by the commission that was tasked with the choice were not to the liking of many of the Councilmembers.

Kassakhian said he understood the design was to bring attention to the crosswalk and would be more visible and therefore a safer crosswalk for pedestrians and vehicles; however, the designs did not reflect the diversity of the City. He showed photos of creative crosswalks in Chinatown in Los Angeles that highlighted the culture of the area.

Kassakhian was the lone "no" vote on moving forward with the artwork that had been presented. The mayor said he wanted to make a point with his vote that staff should be more active and city in the future.

a debate on the There was appointment of one Glendale member to the Burbank-Glendale Pasadena Airport Authority Commission. Retired Glendale Police Chief Carl Povilaitis and former Glendale City Councilmember Frank Quintero had been nominated. Povilaitis had withdrawn his nomination and Councilmember Elen Asatryan voiced her desire to be appointed to this commission, which seemed to catch the other Councilmembers off guard. That led to a debate/discussion that, as Kassakhian described, became a bigger issue than it needed to be. Two callers showed support for Asatryan; however, one of the callers appeared to apply age discrimination in his choice of Asatryan over Quintero, which was pointed out by Councilmember Paula Devine.

In the end the Council voted four to one for Quintero to be voted onto the commission in a term that will last until May 31, 2025. Asatryan voted for herself.

residents oppose a walking/biking trail or a city park but that the proposed path is so close to many of these residential homes, in some cases about three feet from their backyard. Those who have spoken out against the project have many concerns including lack of privacy, environmental issues and risk of fire.

"Many conversations took place with staff and [City] Council members and we were provided assurances on many occasions that [the path] would not come north of the basin," said Patrick Murphy, a member of the Verdugo Wash Neighborhoods Coalition (VWNC) and Save the Wash.

Save the Wash and VWNC are grassroots efforts to bring awareness of the project to residents in the far north area of Glendale including Whiting Woods and the Sycamore area. Many of these are residents whose backyards are close to the wash.

Murphy said an executive summary apparently left out the risk of fire, which is a major concern for residents along the wash.

"The hills and mountains above Whiting Woods have not burned in over 60 years and the Los Angeles County Fire Dept. has designated this entire area as an 'extreme fire hazard zone,"

Residents throughout extreme fire risk areas are either finding their fire insurance rates rising substantially while some are finding their insurance companies canceling their policies completely.
