

THE SECRET POWERS OF SUMMER CAMP

Summer camp evokes different memories for everyone. Day camp experiences are much different than sleep-away camp, for example. Thankfully, there are plenty of experiences that our kids can enjoy, whether day camp, sleep-away camp or a combination of the two.

Though much has been said regarding the COVID pandemic, few disagree that kids suffered a jolt to their routines during lockdown. For example, graduations were altered if not canceled altogether and places where students typically assembled – at school, prom, etc. – were also canceled. Students were relegated to learning via computer, which worked well for some but was terrible for others.

As the pandemic drew to a close and communities were able to meet again in person, it was discovered that students especially did not return unscathed to their routines. Whether experiencing additional stress or lacking social skills, growing children may have missed out on some important milestones.

Summer camp is a way for kids to catch up on some of those milestones while honing skillsets. For example, camp – whether away or day – offers a chance for kids to make new friends, which helps to refine those damaged socialization skills. Research indicates when children don't participate in worthwhile activities their learning curve often decreases during the summer break. Also known as "summer learning loss," this decrease can be averted by having children involved in a camp experience. With so many activities offered, like music, sports and science, kids are kept active while learning abilities can remain elevated.

In addition, campers spend time outdoors – a definite plus when screen time seems to rule the day for many. Many kids develop a "nature deficit disorder" because they're indoors so much. Many summer camps offer a diverse outdoor experience. It can enhance a child's perception of the external world and consequently leads to healthy living.

At many camps, teamwork is encouraged. Whether helping each other to accomplish certain goals or at specific types of camps where teamwork is essential – like a sports



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camp – campers usually have a chance to bond with others. Whether playing, running, jumping, swimming, hiking or climbing – kids can enjoy ways to move. And who knows? Perhaps this attitude will make it home.

The pandemic took away from many a feeling of community. However, camps fortify those feelings of community by promoting a sense of belonging – an essential component to being part of a community.

Another component to being part of a healthy community is self-confidence. Camps can foster in campers a sense

of confidence by challenging them and, with the guidance of able counselors, they can learn new skills and perhaps even discover some hidden talents. Sadly, oftentimes the competitive atmosphere kids find at school can be intimidating. Consequently, they might not be involved in the activities offered. Summer camps, on the other hand, offer an opportunity for participation in non-competitive activities and experience a different sense of accomplishment

CALMING THE BRAIN AT FILTHY HABIT

Armand DesHarnais is sharing his love of ceramics through his business Filthy Habit, a pottery studio that opened a month ago at 1740 Broadview Drive in Sparr Heights. DesHarnais discovered the joy of clay at the age of 18, appreciating his mentor's teaching that the process was more important than the results

"The clay can relate what happened to it [and] that isn't something we have to fight," said DesHarnais.

DesHarnais models his creations after the Song Dynasty era China (960–1279 CE) style, which is known for simple, fluid designs brightly glazed in shades such as lavender and light green. His ultimate goal is to create beautiful, functional pieces that will become heirlooms. He himself has the ceramics his grandmother passed down to his mother and finally him. However, to DesHarnais, clay is not just beautiful. He connects throwing clay to understanding his own brain.

Growing up, he experienced the same question many with ADHD are asked to this day: Why can you focus on something fun but not what is important? For DesHarnais, that something fun was video games; while playing he received constant positive and negative feedback. Many people with ADHD suffer time blindness, which causes them to conceptualize time as fixed rather than constantly in motion, with themselves inhabiting only the present. This, combined with the fact that many with ADHD tend to think quickly and process stimuli slowly, makes planning for the long term difficult.

Like video games, clay provides constant feedback but instead calms one's thoughts. Shaping clay forces the artist to slow down, moving their hands at "a rate that would make a koala jealous."

Clay can tap into hyperfocus, in which the ADHD brain filters out all time, stimuli and extraneous thoughts to devote maximum brain power to the task at hand, resulting in a calm, meditative state. Taylor and Francis Online reported that throwing clay increased gamma power in the parietal lobe – one of the parts of the brain that is structurally different in people with ADHD.

Because of these structural differences, ADHD cannot be "cured." However, DesHarnais has found that there are times outside of his studio he can find that same calm focus and credits this to clay. He also finds that when his students, neurodivergent and neurotypical alike, look up from focusing on their clay, there is always a smile on their faces.

A joint scholarship and Distinguished Person Award celebration will be held on April 28 at the Community Center of La Cañada Flintridge to recognize the recipients.

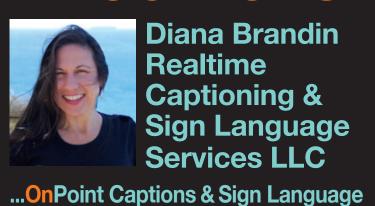

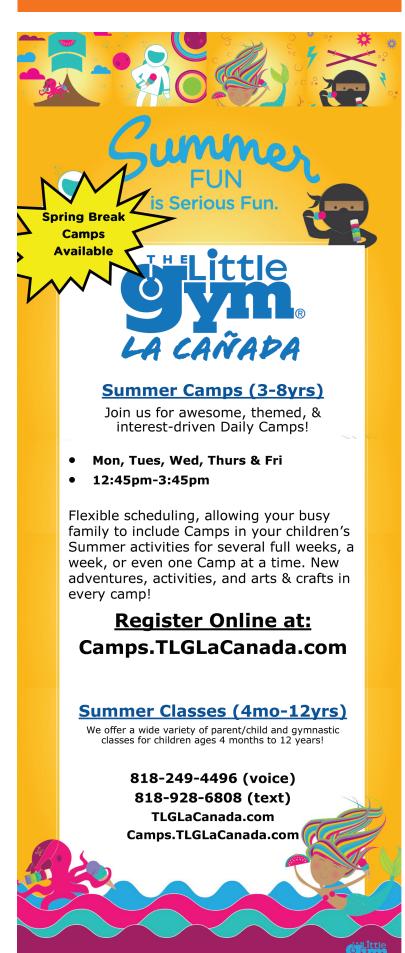

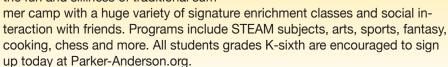
